Even Me

If ever there was a Barney Fife in the Bible, it was Gideon. While Barney's on TV Land, Gideon's story is in Judges 6-8. Rather than being a lawman like Barney, Gideon was an Israelite farmer. Gideon's people had turned their backs on God and the Bible says that, "for seven years, He (God) gave them into the hands of the Midianites." (Judges 6:1) The people cried to the Lord for help.

The Midianites were big bullies and, among other things, they would wait till the Israelite people harvested their crops and then come and steal them.

When it came time to thresh his wheat, Gideon didn't go to the wide open spaces at the top of the mountain as one normally would where the wind could help him by blowing the husks away when the grain was tossed into the air. No, he was afraid that the Midianites could see him up there so he found a pit down in the ground called a winepress to thresh his wheat, there he would be hidden. There the angel of the Lord came to him.

The angel told him, "The Lord is with you, mighty warrior!" "Huh, who? me?" Gideon replied that his tribe was the weakest and he was the runt of the litter. The angel ignored his excuses and told him to go and save the people from the Midianites. You know he was thinking, "Yeah, right!," Gideon was petrified. I can just see him

shaking as his eyes bulged out like Barney's.

He asked for a sign that this was really the Lord speaking to him. So the angel simply put his staff on Gideon's offering and obliterated it. Barney, I mean Gideon, still didn't have confidence that God could use him to save his people so he asked for another sign. He told the angel he would put out a sheep skin and if dew was on it in the morning and the ground was dry, then he would know God would use him. Next morning, the wool was wet and the ground dry. It was still not enough. Gideon asked for another sign. The next morning, if the ground was wet and the wool dry, then he would know that God could use 'even him.' And, of course, God answered, "Yes" again by granting his request.

So Gideon rounded up the Israelite Army, 32,000 strong. The Lord said that was too many so He dwindled the number down to 10,000 then down to just 300. Then He sent them into battle armed only with trumpets and jars with torches in them behind their fearless leader, Gideon (yeah, right!). (Hey, wait a minute, even Barney got to carry a bullet in his pocket!) The Lord thundered and through this little mighty group, He "nipped the Midianites right in the bud."

Gracie Ankles, Today's Busy Teen, needs a double shot of courage to survive in Today's World. Her wilderness is defi-

nately not for the "faint of heart." But, unfortunately, often she can so relate to Gideon and to Barney. She so wants to be fearless, but sometimes she's really scared to death—scared of being laughed at, of being hurt, of being a failure.

Zig Ziglar said, "Remember that failure is an event, not a person." The devil would have us believe we are failures and not worthy. Don't believe his lies!!!

We fear who we believe is in charge of what happens to us. If we have accepted God's gift of salvation, we are His children. If we believe that He is in charge of what happens to us, then we have nothing to fear, do we? He is a gentle Father who loves us enough to die for us, in fact, that's exactly what He did!!

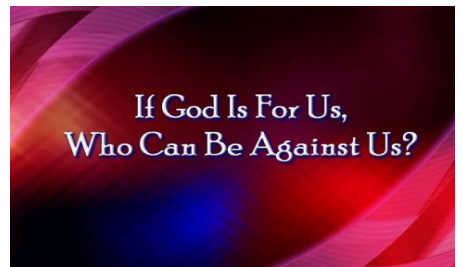

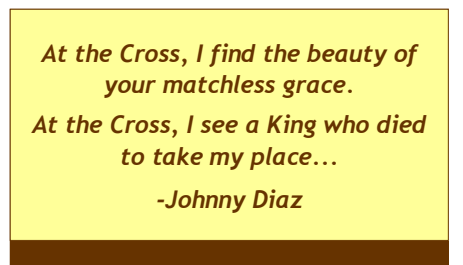

tening to all kinds of music like most of you. And by the way, I happen to have a learning disability! The definition of "disability" is the condition of not being able or fit to do something or limiting what one can do. Well, I don't believe that definition, not anymore anyway!

My first experience in first grade was when I couldn't read a lick! Seriously, I could not read even though everyone else in my class could. That same year, we left public school to go to a small private, Christian school so my Mom could teach part time because my Grammy was very sick and dying from cancer. At that school, I decided to go through first grade again, and still had a lot of trouble reading.

Finally, my family decided to have me tested for any learning problems and that is when we found out about my learning disability. The lady who tested me said it was something that would always be part of who I am, I would never outgrow the disability, but I would find new and different ways to learn things.

We also learned some ways to help me with reading, spelling and writing and we tried all of them. By second grade, I was doing a little better, but I always thought I must just not have a "normal" brain like everyone else! I was never comfortable about my disability and was embarrassed a lot when I messed up on speaking or reading.

There were a lot of things I just didn't try because I thought I couldn't do them.

This past year has been good for me because I have tried some new things that I never would have tried before. First of all, I read all the time! I love books about history especially. I have even started singing with our youth ensemble at my church in front of everyone. To catch up with the grade level I would have been in now, I completed pretty much two grades this year while home schooling! So, I completed seventh and eighth grades so that I would be a little more confident

about myself.

My sister, Samantha, started a girls' Bible study once a week. I didn't think much about it when she planned the study, but once I started reading through the book, and the Bible verses that went with the units each week, I got excited! I was in love with the study and it was awesome spending time with God more than ever and with the girls that came to the study.

The study got me to thinking that maybe God had given me this disability for a reason. We were talking about how God made us all different and able to serve him. We also talked about how what we do now, that it can reflect on our future.

So, I started thinking that instead of feeling bad about myself, that maybe I should use those feelings to talk to other people with disabilities or just encourage them.

Sometimes I get frustrated with people who don't have disabilities who choose not to work to their full potential! Everything I do, I have to work that much harder at it to be successful or good at something. I just don't understand people that are lazy about doing things.

Another thing that happened this year is that a new family came to our Church, the Wimpeys. Brandon is our new Outreach Minister and he and his wife Leah and their baby are so nice. They love God and our Church and Church family so much and I love to be around them.

He is such a good man of God. I found out that he has a learning disability too. Wow! This was amazing to me to see how great he does things for the church and our community, and he does it all, even with a disability!

Another person that makes such a difference in my life is Stacy. She is so precious and smart and beautiful and has a great job teaching cosmetology and works so hard at everything too and is someone I really look up to as a Christian person!

I found out a couple of months ago that she had some of the same learning problems as a child as me. I couldn't believe that she is being used by God every day in everything she does, and does it all in spite of having a learning issue, just like Brandon and just like me! They are both so normal and it helped me see that I can

be normal just like them, if I would stop letting it bother me so much!

Isn't it amazing that God put all these things and people in my life all around me at the same time?

After always feeling not as smart as people and thinking I must not be normal, I now feel good about having my disability, believe it or not! I believe it has made me stronger and that it makes me a hard worker. I've decided that being normal may not be as great as just being "unique", which is what we all are anyway, unique and different in our own way!

Mean Girls

The words on Facebook glared back at her. "You are so ugly! You are fat, annoying

and I hate you!" Lindsay just sat there staring at the screen. "What did I say? What did I do?"

Maybe this has happened to you before. Or maybe you are fortunate enough to have never faced the type of flat out rejection that Lindsay did. I recently spotted a t-shirt at the mall that read, "You're no one until someone talks about you." Growing up today in a world where *Mean Girls* and *Gossip Girl* are our movie and T.V. titles, it comes as no surprise that many of us have been there. We have all experienced rejection or not being accepted by someone or a group of people at some point.

These feelings of being unaccepted are definitely not new. In Song of Solomon 1:5, we are first introduced to a young girl who feels the same way: "I am dark, but lovely..." (NKJV). She felt rejected. Those feelings are so opposite of what we want to feel. We want to be accepted!

So what can we do when we feel out, when we feel rejected? For me, it helps to find out where I am *in*, where I belong. The Lord is very specific about how He feels about me:

"My beloved is mine, and I am His..." (Song of Solomon 2:16a, NKJV). I

am His beloved!

"...All beautiful you are, my darling; there is no flaw in you." (Song of Solomon 4:7b, NIV).

"The king is enthralled by your beauty; honor him, for he is your lord" (Psalm 45:11, NIV).

These are the types of verses I put *everywhere* so that I can read them over and over and over again. When I feel rejected, these words remind me that I am accepted. When mean girl (and life) get you down and cause you to feel like you're not in the "in" crowd, like you don't fit their standards, like you're not good enough, or you don't belong, remember what God says. You are accepted. You are loved exactly as you are. The world may tell you hurtful things about yourself or reject you, but their words do not reflect the reality of God's feelings for you. God's truths, His promises in His Word stand forever, and those are what we must listen to.

Prayer:

Dear Jesus, Rejection is really hard to take. Please help me to run to You and fill myself up with Your love and truth. Help me to understand how much You accept and love me. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Think About It:

When someone puts me down, how do I respond?

Am I cautious about the words I say or the way I treat others so that I myself am not a "mean girl"?

Live It:

Look around you. Find a person who may be feeling rejected and purposefully reach out to them.

Write out one of the verses in the devo and give it to a friend who needs to hear those words.

Power Verses:

Zephaniah 3:17, "The Lord your God is with you, He is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you, He will quiet you with His love, He will rejoice over you with singing." (NIV)

Zechariah 2:8, "For this is what the Lord Almighty says, '...for whoever touches you touches the apple of his eye.' (NIV)
